WELCOME TO THE SONGFEST!

We're happy you've decided to come to the 4th annual CAT Songwriters Festival!

Here's what you'll need to know to get the most out of it:

WHAT YOU'LL NEED/WHAT YOU'LL GET

If you plan to present a song for a critique session, you should have a CD of the song (or present it live), lyric sheets (bring at least 6 for each song, but 20 would be better), and if you have a portable recorder, it will help you remember what the remarks are. You can present one song each day of the Festival.

If you play, bring your ax. There'll be opportunities to collaborate with other writers. Also, there will be writer's rooms for your use. A piano will be available for use, but a portable keyboard would be a good idea.

Lunch will be provided free of charge each day (sandwiches, fruit, etc.), and discounts will be available for nearby restaurants for other meals. Snacks will be available all day.

If you're attending both days and need accommodations, we can give you a list of lodgings that are offering discounts to Songfest attendees. Let us know and we'll send it along.

HOW TO GET THERE

If you drive, the NYS Thruway, Catskill exit, is about 4 miles from Space 360. Follow signs to Hudson (you'll drive over the beautiful Rip Van Winkle Bridge). The Taconic Parkway is a good choice from NYC...get off at Route 82 and follow signs for Hudson.

Hudson is a great walking town, and everything you'll need is a short walk away. So it's not a bad idea to take the train to the Festival. Amtrak has a station 4 blocks from Space 360. Check their schedule...several trains arrive on Saturday morning.

Space 360 is at 360 Warren Street, which is the main drag in town. It's between 3rd and 4th Street, just past the Hudson Opera House on the north side of the street.

Just outside of Hudson are some beautiful rural towns that you could visit if you come on Friday, or stay longer.

We will ask you for your choices when you register at the door, so we can make sure no one misses out.
